### **CIVICS IN THE NEWS**

On August 5th, Governor Kim Reynolds of lowa ended the state's lifetime disenfranchisement for most people with felony convictions. The state's permanent ban on voting for previously incarcerated people was the only one in the U.S., and its removal is being applauded by voting rights activists nationwide. The order will allow around 60,000 lowans to register to vote before the fall election, including nearly 10% of the state's Black population. With ongoing conversations about racism in the criminal-legal system, this decision further erodes felony disenfranchisement laws that became common following the Civil War and the legal expansion of the franchise to Black men.

U.S. District Court Judge William Osteen ordered that North Carolina elections officials <u>must allow residents to fix any</u> <u>problems with mail-in ballots before</u> <u>they're thrown out</u>. Lawyers have claimed that the ruling will potentially save up to 100,000 voters from having their ballots invalidated this fall. Black voters were disproportionately likely to have their ballots rejected, according to the lawsuit. <u>Texas voters still have no option to fix</u> <u>mail-in ballots</u>, and may not find out their ballot has been rejected until after the election.

In Hong Kong, <u>following a new national</u> <u>security law imposed by Beijing</u> in June, schools are now being forced to remove books that may promote "secession, subversion, terrorism, and collusion with foreign powers." Academics and prodemocracy activists worry how this might affect the freedom of expression for students and teachers in Hong Kong.
